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Visitor's Center Groundbreaking

The T.C. Steele State Historic Site in Nashville has broken ground for the new Singing Winds Visitor Center. Members of the arts community along with Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites President and CEO Cathy Ferree, gathered on Saturday for the ceremony at the historic site.



Thanks to the visionary leadership and generosity of Barbara and Bob Stevens, along with a matching gift from the state, the Singing Winds Visitor Center will help enhance the guest experience and allow for additional programming, indoor facility rentals and catering, along with new restrooms on the grounds of the site. The addition will also allow for the expansion of the Artist-in-Residence program as well as the interpretation of the House of the Singing Winds.

The new visitor center will include an orientation area, coffee bar, workroom, expanded gift shop and offices. This will allow for the current ticket sales, gift shop and offices to be consolidated into one location and removed from historic structures.

The 4,600-square-foot, state-of-the-art visitor center will be located in the historic area just south of the large studio and the House of the Singing Winds. It will be built where a large guest cottage was formerly located. The visitor center is scheduled to open in fall of 2018.

Memories from a Steele Descendent

When I was 12 years old, Woodruff Place was magical. Great Granddaddy Brandt Steele, T.C. Steele's son, was a real storyteller. The house always seemed quiet and a little dark, with rows of books and other beautiful pieces of art. Perhaps I was attracted to his gruff voice, silky white hair, and wonderful pipe smell.

My brother and I liked to investigate the maze of rooms including the basement where Granddaddy had his pottery studio. But on this Sunday afternoon we sat down next to his chair. I remember Granddaddy taking

a match box and making it stand up straight on the back of his hand.

Can you guess the trick – he had pinched some of his soft wrinkly hand to the matchbox. But I really thought it was magic. One of his other tricks was marking a black bird on one of this finger. Singing the song he would make the black bird fly away and then return or sit on the other hand, "Blackbird Bye Bye".

One of the other stories was about a grasshopper that got caught in a sprinkling can and his frustration on how to get out. It had a simple moral and surprise ending. (If anyone knows the story, let me know) I am sorry not to remember his moral to the story.

We then went out to the front porch where there was a beautiful magnolia tree. I know Granddaddy had pulled out a picture of a little girl sitting on his shoulder next to the blooming tree. He then reached over to my sister Sue, who was about three years old. Granddaddy hoisted her to his shoulders. With flashbulbs flashing we all enjoyed the reenactment of the picture of my mom sitting on Granddaddy's shoulder, just like the picture in front of us.

I wish now I would have asked more questions about Granddaddy's life. His sweet nature and positive attitude were a needed influence of balance in my life.

Friends of T.C. Steele Win A Heritage Support Grant!

Steele's Studio Wagon to Be Reconstructed in 2018!

The Friends of T.C. Steele State Historic Site are excited to announce the award of a Heritage Support grant from the Indiana Historical Society! The project, to reconstruct T.C. Steele's Studio Wagon and make it a permanent, interactive outdoor exhibit, will begin in January 2018.

The wagon will be an approximate replica of the one used by the painter from 1896-1913. There are no photographs of the original wagon, as it burned in a barn fire in 1913, but we do have descriptions of the wagon from the painter's daughter, Daisy, published in part I of *The House of the Singing Winds*. We will be using these descriptions as a guide in creating the exhibit. The wagon will be furnished with art supplies and other objects that will allow visitors to pretend that they are out on the road with the painter, traveling Indiana at the turn of the century.

One of the reasons the Friends have supported the wagon project is because the site as it is now is primarily for adults. Nothing here is designed for children, or was created with children in mind. This wagon answers that need by offering a learning opportunity for kids and their families. Children and adults can "play" frontier, play painter, and will hopefully engage with the history and frontier narrative when they have an actual wagon, and art supplies for their own drawings, and facsimile food to play camping. Other questions will naturally arise--how did a whole family sleep in a wagon? Where would they have gotten food to eat while on the road? How would they keep warm? How far could they expect to travel in one day? How would Steele's family keep occupied when they were camped for days at a time and the painter was at work? By setting the scene we know we can capture the imagination of our visitors and make history come alive through play; we hope this will widen the audience for T.C. Steele State Historic Site.

The IHS Heritage Support award amount is \$44,000.00, with the understanding that the Friends must raise a 15% match of the awarded amount, approximately \$6,600.00, by the end of year 2018. To reach the goal, the Friends are beginning a fundraising campaign to raise \$7,000.00 for the Studio Wagon, and have committed \$10,000.00 to the wagon's maintenance over the next ten years. Expect to hear more about the fundraising efforts soon! We are incredibly honored to have been fully funded (every penny requested was awarded!) for this highly competitive grant. We believe that the new Singing Winds Visitor Center has helped demonstrate that T.C. Steele State Historic Site is a beloved and necessary place, worthy of support and attention. Introducing Board Member Pauline Archambault

Born and raised in Strasbourg, France, Pauline currently lives in Cincinnati, Ohio, where she works as a Fine Art specialist and appraiser at Cowan's Auctions. After coming to the United States in 2007 to study English literature at Indiana University, she obtained a Master's Degree in Art History from the University of Cincinnati, and has since become very interested in American Impressionism. T. C. Steele is a particularly fascinating artist to Pauline because, while counting as an important figure of the American Impressionist movement, he also emerged as a precursor to the Regionalist School of the 1930s. His devotion to the landscapes of Indiana indeed paved the way for the artistic attention that the Midwest would enjoy a few years after Steele's death.

In the context of her work, Pauline has examined, researched and sold several paintings by Steele, and has witnessed the consistent appeal of his work to art collectors. Although the market for American Impressionism in general has softened in recent years, outstanding works by remarkable artists still achieve impressive prices. Steele is no exception to this rule: while his smaller landscapes fetch prices averaging \$7,000-10,000, his more sizable works, specifically rural scenes featuring paths and figures, continue to bring in the \$20,000-40,000 range.
